U. S. To Borrow 4 Billions More

Washington—Secretary Morgenthau announced yesterday the Treasury, breaking all financing records, would borrow about \$2,000,000,000 in May and another \$2,000,000,000 in June.

Either of these borrowings would be larger than any single financing in the history of the Treasury.

The money will be borrowed through the sale of securities to banks, insurance companies, wealthy individuals and other large investors.

Morgenthau explained that this money was needed in addition to proceeds from the sale of war bonds and from tax collections to finance the war effort in the next few months.

War expenditures now are running close to \$3,000,000,000 per month.
