AT ARCO, IDAHO— Judge J. D. Martin Claimed By Death Wilkes Native Dies At Age of 89 After Brilliant Career in West

Roaring River.—Judge James D. Martin, 89, Arco, Idaho, native of Wilkes, who often wrote The Journal-Patriot, died in his sleep April 13. Funeral and interment were in Idaho.

Oldest son and last surviving child of Col. Leland Martin, of Wilkes, and Mrs. Laura Corpening Martin, native of Burke, he was a brother of the late Harry C. Martin, of Lenoir and Blowing Rock, former editor of News-Topic, and of the late Associate Justice Philetus A. Martin, of the Texas Court of Appeals. Judge Martin was a first cousin of James T. Martin, of Ronda; Mrs. D. S. Lane, the late Mrs. N. T. Jarvis and others; and a double first cousin of Julius C. Martin and Mrs. Laura Linney.

MORE FOR TRUCKS— Eleven Passenger Tires Is Quota For Wilkes For May

**Few Tires To Be Distributed
 To Many Eligible Appli-
 cants In Month**

Only eleven new passenger car tires are included in the tire quota for Wilkes for the month of May, it was learned today from draft board officials.

The eleven tires are to be divided between the two rationing boards in the county.

However, the quota allows 59 passenger recapped tires and 35 tubes.

The truck quota is more promising with 86 new tires, 137 recaps and 119 tubes. These also must be divided between the two boards. It has been pointed out that the quota will not be sufficient to supply all eligible applicants.

New Zealand Is Under U.S. Command

Wellington, New Zealand.—Prime Minister Peter Frazer declared today that New Zealand and the neighboring islands, including Fiji had been included in the South Pacific operations area now under United States naval command.

"It was our desire that Australia and New Zealand should remain closely linked in one area under General MacArthur," Frazer said.

"We made representations accordingly, but strategic considerations as determined in Washington must prevail and we have accordingly concurred in the above organization."

Frazer said there would be the closest cooperation between the areas, "while the whole area of the Pacific will be co-ordinated by the combined chiefs of staff and the Pacific war counsel in Washington."
