Poppy Day To Be May 23rd

Citizens To Participate In Most Far-Reaching Campaign in Bond Drive

Poppies of patriotic remembrance will bloom in North Wilkesboro Saturday, May 23, Miss Ruth Colvard, president of the American Legion Auxiliary, announced today.

Every man, woman and child in the city will be asked to wear a poppy on that day in honor of the men who have given their lives for America. The poppies will be distributed by volunteer workers from the Auxiliary and the coins contributed for them will be used in Legion and Auxiliary work for the war disabled, their families and the families of the dead.

The poppies which will be distributed here have been made by disabled veterans at Oteen. Making the little red flowers has given many veterans employment during the winter and spring months. The work is limited to men receiving little or no government compensation and those with families to support.

Contributions received for the poppies on Poppy Day are a principal source of support for the vast welfare work carried on by the Legion and Auxiliary and the disabled men and dependent families. With the new war adding to the list of America's war victims, there will be greatly increased need for funds during the coming year.

Poppy Day has been observed by the Legion and Auxiliary annually for the past twenty years. With the nation again at war, the poppy has new significance this year and will be worn as a symbol of patriotism by millions of Americans throughout the country.

More than 13,000,000 of the flowers have been made by disabled veterans for the Auxiliary, the largest number since the observance of Poppy Day was begun twenty years ago. Orders for the poppies from Auxiliary units everywhere have been increased this year in anticipation of greatly increased demand for the flowers of patriotic remembrance.

—BUY WAR BONDS—

This County To Do Its Share In War Bond Drive This Week

Citizens of this county are being taken out of competition for consumer goods, thereby preventing inflation and building up a cushion of savings for the individual when the war ends.

Following up Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau's recent announcement that North Carolina's quota of war bonds and stamps for May had been set at \$5,888,480, State Administrator Charles E. Robertson and State Chairman Julian Price of Greensboro said in a joint statement that "we are confident North Carolinians can be counted upon to exceed the quota set for our State."

The type of campaign varies for different communities, it being left up to the local chairman to determine the type to reach the most citizens. All canvassers will be volunteer workers.

All income earners are expected to sign the pledge, regardless of whether they have already subscribed to the payroll allotment or similar plans. At their option they may increase the amount of their allotment in signing the pledge card or they may let their present savings program constitute the amount of the pledge.

The pledge is in triplicate. The original pledge will be sent to Washington, one duplicate will be retained by the pledgor, and the other copy will be sent to the State Offices of the Defense Savings Staff in Greensboro.
