

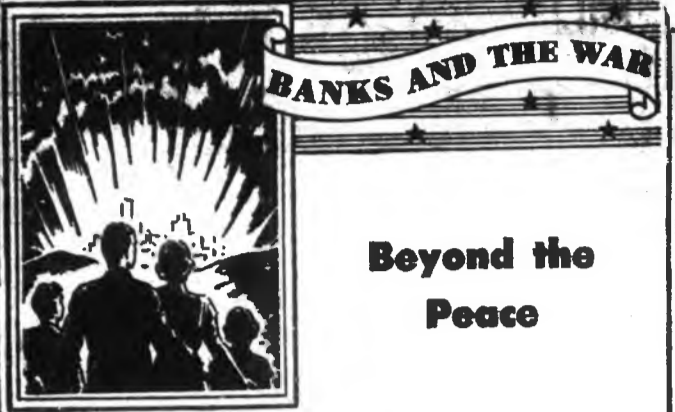
Brief Local News Items About People You Know
