While the committees were preparing the state delegation list and the resolutions, Chairman Casey called on several Republicans for talks. Former Solicitor John R. Jones started the ball rolling with a rousing speech in which he paid his "respects" in no uncertain terms to Frank Woodhouse, the Yadkin county Democratic representative who "disfranchised every voter in Wilkes county when he introduced and supported a bill in the 1939 session of the General Assembly to divide Wilkes county into districts." Mr. Jones said "that this was taxation without representation," and he called on the good, honest Democrats of the county to join with the Republicans in a fight to get this "abominable" bill repealed. Mr. Jones also made a strong attack against the Democratic leadership of the county for allowing so much politics in the school system of the county.

Others addressing the convention were R. Don Laws, N. B. Smithey, Presley E. Brown, and J. B. Norris. Olin Watson was another speaker, and he said that "his friend John R. Jones should apologize to Hitler for calling Frank Woodhouse 'Hitler'."

The convention re-elected N. B. Smithey chairman, and R. Don Laws, secretary, of the county executive committee for the next two years.

either new or recapped tires. Restrictions on Vans

11—Moving vans are no longer eligible for new tires unless they qualify as common carriers. Restrictions were loosened slightly in connection with mail carriers' vehicles, which henceforth will be eligible if used "principally," instead of "exclusively" as heretofore, in delivering mail.

Another beneficial move was seen in the announcement that the deadline for filing applications to replenish reserve supplies had been advanced to June 15. Formerly it was May 15, last Friday. Officials pointed out that tires secured as reserves would not be charged against the county's quotas, and urged all governments, concerns and agencies which are eligible to file application as soon as possible.

Concerning the "abuse" of tires, which would make the abuser ineligible for further tires, officials said that standards had been set up to guide the boards in deciding when a tire is recappable and when it has been abused or neglected. These standards, however, have not been received by the local boards as yet.
