

F. C. Forester Quoted in News and Observer

Raleigh News and Observer today - Governor Broughton yesterday bluntly expressed his resentment of OPA's approval of a 2.5-cent increase in gasoline prices in a letter to OPA Boss Leon Henderson and urged the North Carolina Congressional delegation to make a joint or individual protest of the "unjust discrimination."

"My protest does not apply only to the fact that the increase will cost the state of North Carolina a state at least \$500,000 annually and the people of the state at least \$13,000,000 annually, according to the estimate of our State Highway Chairman."

Broughton wrote the congressional delegates. "In addition to this circumstance, there is a very general and well justified feeling on the part of our citizens that the imposition of this unwarranted increase, added to the already heavy and almost devastating gas rationing limit for the citizens of this state and other eastern states, it is a gross discrimination against our people."

Two Burden - "They reasonably ask the question: If we are to bear the burden of gas rationing, why at least could not some more favored section bear the burden of added price?"

"Our people are willing to make any sacrifice to end this war, but they do resent unjust discrimination and I share with them this deep resentment."

Dislocates Budgets - The unheralded price increase is expected to dislocate the budgets of the State School Commission and the State Highway Patrol, both of which are large gas-

oline consumers and also operate on a close budgetary margin.

Two independent gasoline distributors, at a recent meeting in Raleigh, stated that gasoline already had increased an average of two cents a gallon within the last year, and both the spokesmen said they could find no justification for the increase.

One of them, Floyd C. Forester of North Wilkesboro, said he was obtaining bulk gasoline at a price lower than he obtained a year ago.

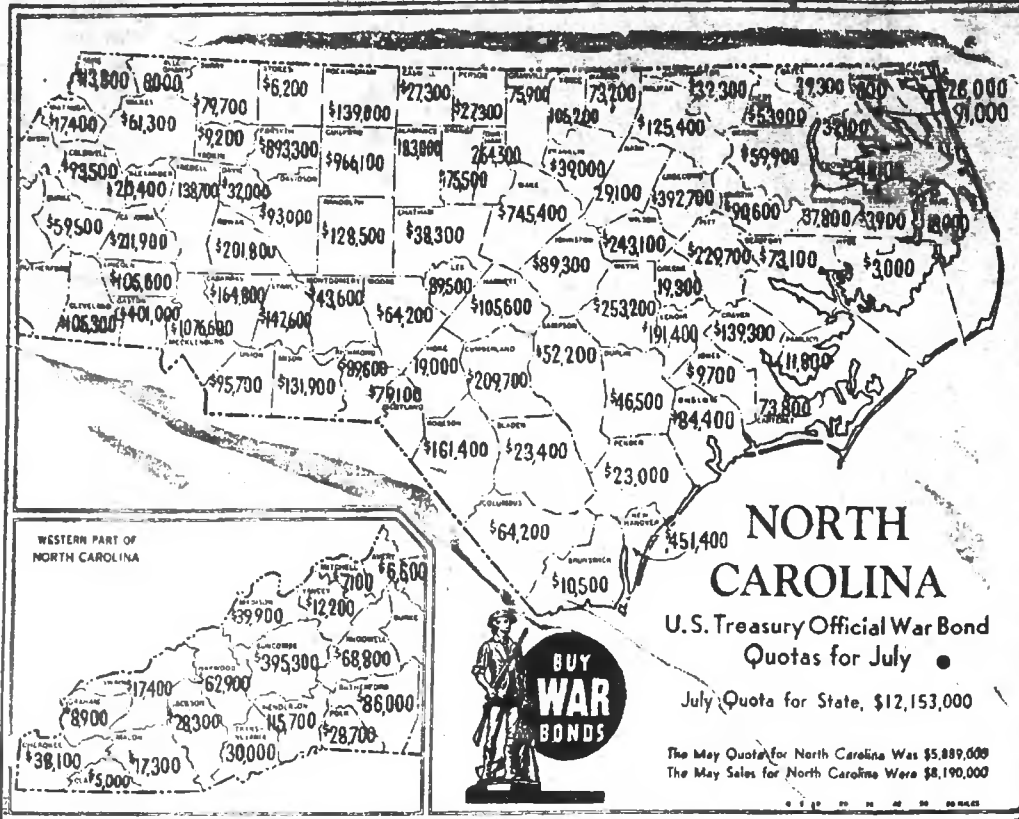
