# Scouters' Training Courses Planned

## Men Asked To Take Course For Leadership In Organizing New Boy Scout Troops In Wilkes County

At the regular June meeting of the Wilkes District Boy Scouts of America plans were made for a Scouters' Training Course to begin in July. This training course will be conducted in a manner similar to a Boy Scout Troop and is designed to familiarize all Scouters, particularly new and old Scoutmasters and Troop Committeemen, with the most modern ideas in Scouting. In order that additional Troops may be started in the county, it is particularly desirable that as many men as possible from the rural sections attend these sessions.

The Scoutmaster of this training troop will be Gordon Finley, who has taken a course in this work at Guilford College. The other officers are: Assistant Scoutmaster, Robert Gibbs; Senior Patrol Leader, Edward Finley; Scribe, T. E. Story; Quartermaster, Glenn McNeil; Patrol Leaders, Lewis Nelson, Jimmie Anderson, Jim Carter and Bill Dubling. These Patrol Leaders have an important assignment ev-

en before the course starts. It is their job to recruit, and see that they attend regularly, six or eight men each to fill up their patrol. Any men interested in taking this course are asked to contact one of these Patrol Leaders. The course will be given on Friday nights at 7:30, to last not more than 1-2 hours. They are scheduled to begin July 17th and will continue for seven successive Fridays, to be held in the Presbyterian religious education building.

## Navy Recruiter Interviews Men

Bruce Gatton, of the Salisbury office of the U. S. Navy recruiting service, spent Friday and Saturday in this city interviewing men and taking their applications for enlistment in the navy.

He will be at the town hall here again on Thursday and Friday of this week and all men interested in enlisting in the navy or the naval reserves are urged to contact him while here. For the benefit of any who may not understand, the recruiting officer explains that there is no difference in the regular navy and the naval reserve except that those who enlist in the reserve will be released at the end of the national emergency and those in the regular navy enlist for a term of six years. All have the same opportunities and receive the same treatment. Attention is called to the fact that Lieut. Wray will be at the Salisbury office on Thursday, July 23, to interview men with trades who wish to serve in the construction division of the navy.

Local boards in North Carolina have all been advised that they should fill their July and subsequent call in accordance with the policy, if possible. But the boards have also been advised that that the national interest requires that all calls to meet the manpower requirements of the armed forces must be filled on schedule. If any local board does not have a sufficient number of single 1-A men available to fill its call, it has been authorized to depart from the general rule of priority and use married men who ordinarily might be expected to be in category three, if such departure is necessary to meet said call.

The school budget calls for expenditure of \$13,205, of which \$5,666.36 will be raised by the tax levy and the remainder from other sources.

The city council appropriated \$200 for equipment for the State Guard company here.

Category one: Single men with no dependents.

Category two: Single men with dependents.

Category three: Married men who do not have children; but who maintain a bona fide relationship in their homes with their wives, provided marriage took place prior to December 8, 1941, and at a time when selection was not imminent.

Category four: Registrants who with their wives and children, or with their children alone, maintain a bona fide family relationship in their homes, provided marriage took place prior to December 8, 1941, and at a time when selection was not imminent.

of his death. He was critically ill for a week.

He was born and reared in Woodward, S. C., the son of Samuel Lumpkin and Laura Brice Lumpkin, and was educated in the public schools of Woodward and Chester, S. C., and a preparatory school at Huntersville, N. C.

In 1899 he began his career in the railroad business with the S. A. L. Railway company. Three years later he became connected with the C.C.C. railway company at Charlotte. In 1905 he moved to Durham and was connected with the Durham and Southern Railway company until he retired in 1940. At the time of his retirement he was manager of the local office and general freight and passenger agent for the Durham and Southern, which position he had held since 1915. Since moving to Durham he was a member of the Trinity Methodist church.

On January 27, 1902, he married Miss Maye Brandon of Pulaski, Tenn., who survives, as do two children from this union, Mrs. J. Palmer Horton of North Wilkesboro and Donald R. Lumpkin of Durham; two grandchildren, Palmer Horton, Jr., and Donald Horton, both of North Wilkesboro. Also surviving are three sisters, Miss Emmie Lumpkin, Miss Mary Lumpkin, both of Washington, D. C., and Miss Laura Lumpkin of Charlotte.

## War News

### British Advance On African Front

Cairo.—The British army of the Nile, sparked by reinforcements of eager Australians, had driven the Axis corps ten miles east of El Alamein yesterday and consolidated its new hold in the Tel El Eisa sector of Egypt, after capturing 2,900 tired Germans and Italians and destroying 18 tanks.

### German Troops Push Back Reds

Moscow, Monday.—German troops, sweeping through Kantemirovka and Lisichansk in their push toward the Caucasus, have rolled the Red army back 70 more miles to Boguebar in the greatest penetration yet of Russian soil, the Soviets acknowledged officially today.

### R. A. F. Hammers Port Of Danzig

London.—Striking a body blow in the battle of the Atlantic, squadron after squadron of giant, four-motored British bombers roared low over Germany on a 1,750-mile daylight round-trip late Saturday to blast the German submarine building base at Danzig on the Baltic.

## Bond Insignia On Gas Ration Card Is Good For Gas

The war bond insignia on your gasoline rationing card is good for purchase of gasoline until July 22, when the present cards expire and the permanent gasoline rationing plan starts.

OPA announced that the part of the card where the war bond insignia is located can be used for a purchase of gasoline when all units have been removed or punched.

But the war bond insignia has varying values according to the type of card. On A cards it is good for the purchase of three gallons; on B1 cards, four gallons; on B2 cards five gallons; and on B3 cards six gallons.

All remaining units on all types of cards are good for purchase of six gallons each until July 22.

## Former Resident Of Wilkes Passes

Mrs. Maro Bumgarner Berry, wife of Commander George A. Berry, U.S.N. retired, died Thursday in an Asheville hospital after several days illness.

Funeral service was held Friday at an Asheville funeral home and the body was taken to Arlington cemetery in Washington, D. C., for burial.

Mrs. Berry was a member of a prominent Wilkes family, a daughter of the late George W. and Mary Nichols Bumgarner, of the Millers Creek community. During the first World War she served as a nurse in a government hospital. She was first married to the late Charlie Holland of Washington, D. C., and later to Commander Berry, also of Washington, but they had made their home for the past several years in Asheville. There are two children, Caroline and Devore Berry, who were by her first marriage but were adopted by Commander Berry.

Also surviving Mrs. Berry are the following five brothers: Rev. J. L. A. Bumgarner, M. F., Gaither, Charlie S., and Vincent Bumgarner, of the Millers Creek community, and one sister, Mrs. Phoebe Patterson, of Chattanooga, Tennessee.
