Ferguson News Items In Brief

Ferguson has some very interesting visitors from Europe in the persons of Mrs. Robert L. Ferguson and daughter, Tamara, who recently arrived in America from Lisbon, Portugal. Mrs. Ferguson and daughter will probably be in America for the duration of the war and while they expect to visit many relatives in this section they are now making their home with Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Foster, Mrs. Foster being a sister to Mr. Ferguson, who still retains his position with the American Embassy in Lisbon. Mrs. Ferguson, while being a native Russian and a granddaughter of a baron under the old Czar regime, is highly educated, speaking the Russian and English languages very fluently, besides she speaks four other languages well also. She recently spent about two years in Nice, France, and she gives a very interesting description of the depravity and starvation conditions now prevailing in that country. Thousands of people have only cherries to eat, and much of the food attainable is spoiled and unfit for use. Mrs. Ferguson presents pictures of the present habits and customs of the French people forced upon them by the war. The chief method of travel is a cart pulled by bicycles in tandem form.

Mr. and Mrs. J. C. McNeil and family visited in the home of Mr. R. L. Proffit, of Goshen, Sunday afternoon.

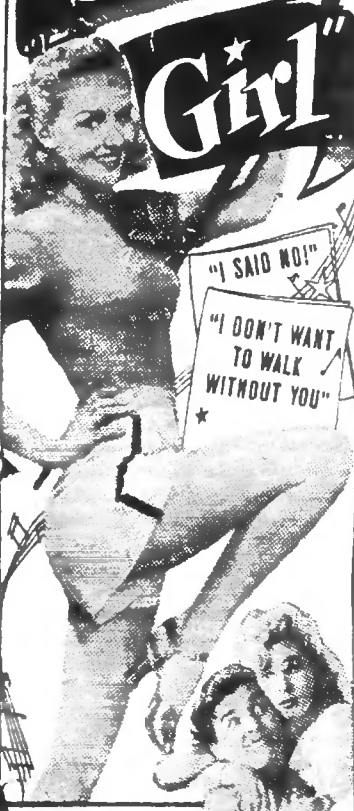
