Boney died at Rex hospital here illness.

He served as deputy insurance ommissioner from 1935, until when Governor A. W. McLean appointed him insurance commission to fill a vacancy left by the resignation of Stacey W. Wade. Since his appointment, Boney has been elected to the insurance post four times by popular vote.

He was elected chairman of the xecutive committee of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners in 1930 and became president of the organiza-


