## State Heads Mourn Workers Wanted

Raleigh, Sept. 7.—North Carolina officials today mourned the death of Dan C. Boney, 49, who had served as state insurance commissioner since 1937. Boney died at Rex hospital here early this morning after a short illness.

He served as deputy insurance commissioner from 1935, until when Governor A. W. McLean appointed him insurance commissioner to fill a vacancy left by the resignation of Stacey W. Wade. Since his appointment, Boney has been elected to the insurance post four times by popular vote.

He was elected chairman of the executive committee of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners in 1930 and became president of the organiza-

During the First World war, Boney served overseas with the 118th field artillery and was severely wounded in battle.

On hearing of the death of the insurance commissioner Governor

Broughton said: "Dan C. Boney was outstanding among the insurance commissioners of the United States... to a brilliant and sacrificial record as a soldier he added a record of public administration that will long be a matter of pride to the state."

He was the son of Mrs. Susan McKinnis Boney and the late H. F. Boney of Kinston and was born at Elkin in 1895. He was graduated in public schools of Elkin and Kinston and at the University of North Carolina. He married the former Miss Charlotte Elizabeth Johnson of Raleigh who died last year.

Surviving are two sons, Dan C. Boney, Jr., 12, and Arthur Johnson, 11; his mother; two sisters, Mrs. M. A. Batten of Kinston and Mrs. B. S. Stokes of Robersonville; and two brothers, W. E. Boney of Kinston and David M. Boney of Richmond.
