well since he was attacked by two prisoners last November while transporting them from North Carolina to Washington, and his death is attributed to some extent to the severe blow he suffered on the head at that time.

The marshal and Mrs. Dowd were assaulted about 20 miles south of Petersburg, Va., by two prisoners whose names Dowd gave, upon his return to Greensboro, as John Benson Oden, of Oklahoma, and John Venson Stard, of Long Island, N. Y. The marshal's injury was not then believed to be serious.

The youths, who had escaped from National Training school at Washington, had been sentenced a few days previously by Judge Johnson J. Hayes to serve three additional years each for larceny of a car which was brought to North Carolina.

Poultry School And Egg Show On April 8th

A poultry school and egg show will be held in the Y. M. C. A. of Elkin, on Thursday, April 8, starting at 10 a. m. ewt. This school is being worked up by the county agents of Wilkes, Surry, and Yadkin counties for the poultrymen of these and surrounding counties.

The morning program will consist of talks by Dr. R. S. Dearstyn, head of the Poultry Department at State College; C. F. Parish, Extension Poultry Specialist; T. T. Brown, Extension Egg Specialist and M. P. Maupin, Poultry Specialist of State College. These men are well prepared to discuss problems such as selecting good baby chicks, proper feeding, housing, sanitation and diseases, and grading, candling, and marketing eggs.

The secretary of the Y. M. C. A. has agreed to prepare and sell lunch at actual cost to those attending the school.

The afternoon program will be given over to the poultrymen to present any problem which they may be having with their poultry business. The specialists will attempt to answer all questions asked by the poultrymen and in this way all will get the benefit of the information given on the particular problems. After the opening discussion, Dr. Dearstyn will examine and perform an autopsy on any diseased bird brought in by the poultrymen.

The program will end with the awarding of approximately fifty prizes given by the commercial hatcheries and merchants in the surrounding counties for the best dozen of white and brown eggs. Since there is such a large number of prizes offered, each poul-

tryman stands a good chance of winning, so I would like to urge each of you to make an entry in the egg show. No one will be allowed to enter more than one dozen each of the white and brown eggs.

Due to the fact that poultry and eggs are included in our food goals, and that the poultrymen of Wilkes county are making such rapid progress, I am sure that many of you will want to attend this school in order that you might get the latest information on the poultry outlook.

WAAC Booth At J. C. Penney Co.
