

This condition has hurt the small farmer most. A study of their circumstances reveals that they still use the old methods and simple tools, they stick to a one cash crop, many are share croppers, their business methods are poor, and they are most often terribly in debt. A poor tenure system often adds to their poor plight: about three million tennant families moving yearly which cost them more than \$50,000,000 each year. In 1936 nearly two million farm people were trying to live on \$500.00 per year.

The Farm Security Administration has since 1937 been trying to aid these people to get on a more positive plan of living. It has undertaken to aid them in securing first a plan of producing at home the food and feed for home use; second to produce a number of cash crops, and third to rebuild ill at her home in Wilkesboro their eroded soils. 
