Nazi Leader Orders 3,000 Planes Moved

London—Adolf Hitler, in a desperate effort to strengthen his Mediterranean defenses, has called in the leaders of his Balkan satellite for conference and has sent 3,000 first-line planes to Southern Italy, reports reaching here last night.

Marshal Ion Antonescu, Rumanian premier, was the first of the Balkan leaders to reach Hitler's headquarters. DNB, the official German News Agency, said Hitler received Antonescu Monday.

A Rome broadcast said Antonescu conferred with Hitler until yesterday.
