Elkin District W. S. C. S. Has Fine Meeting Here

Mrs. C. N. Clark and Mrs. C. B. Dawsey, Jr., visiting speakers delivered inspirational messages at the annual meeting of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Elkin district which was held in North Wilkesboro, Tuesday, May 4th.

To open the meeting, which was held at the Woman's Clubhouse, Mrs. Herbert Cobb, of the Wilkesboro Society, led a directed meditation, after which Mrs. A. C. Spagoner, of the hostess church, spoke words of welcome with response being given by Mrs. Oscar Elliott, also of the Wilkesboro church. Mrs. Harry Pearson, of North Wilkesboro, and president of the district, presided and Mrs. B. S. Call, of Wilkesboro, served as secretary.

"Thy Kingdom Come" was the theme for Mrs. Cobb's meditation, which was interspersed with a number of hymns played softly at the piano by Mrs. William Marlow. Mrs. Cobb said His Kingdom of peace, love, and service, must come through each of us.

Mrs. Dawsey, of Boone, and rural worker for the district, in beginning quoted Edwin Markham's poem "Live and Let Live" as basis for her thoughts. God has given each of us various gifts, and he expects us to use these gifts in service for Him, for it is a definite responsibility that we have.

In telling about her work she stated that she had organized five Youth Fellowships and two Woman's Societies. A great need in her work was literature to hand to new societies and Youth Fellowships when organized, and she urged that Societies please pass on to her study books, program materials, or other literature that they have finished with.

With "Reserves" as her topic for discussion, Mrs. Clark, of Mt. Airy, and conference vice-president, made a most interesting comparison of our nation's fighting forces and the work of the Woman's Society. The government says to our men "go," and God says to us "go," and it is imperative that we do unite our women in service. Our Woman's Society's Army is made up of missionaries, doctors, teachers, Bible women, deaconesses, and other workers, and our bases are our schools, settlement houses, orphanages, Wesley Houses, centers, hospitals, and other Christian institutions. Reserves are greatly needed to carry on this work, and it is up to our women to bring up these Reserves, and they must come from our homes and from our pocketbooks.

During the morning session reports were heard from a number of the district officers including Mrs. Edd F. Gardner, of North Wilkesboro, the new corresponding secretary of the district. Mrs. Gardner stated that the district pledge for last year of \$2,200 was paid in full, and pledge for this year was \$2,250. She urged that all Societies get their reports in on time, also that those Societies which had not been sending in their reports begin to do so at once. Lunch was served by the hostess church during the noon hour.

An Open Forum led by Mrs. Clark featured the afternoon session. Other items of interest were roll call, making of pledges, and the election of district officers, who are as follows: President, Mrs. Harry Pearson, North Wilkesboro; vice-president, Mrs. Herbert Cobb, Wilkesboro; secretary, Mrs. B. Inskeep, Roaring Gap; Christian Social Relations and Local Church Activities, Mrs. Eugene Spainhour, Elkin; secretary of Missionary Education, Mrs. E. W. Crow, Mocksville; supplies, Mrs. T. H. Redmon, Farmington; literature and publications, Mrs. John D. Reece, Yadkinville; secretary of Children's work, Mrs. J. B. Henderson, Wilkesboro; student work, Mrs. James Winkler, Boone; Young Women's and Girls' work, Mrs. Clyde Walker, of Booneville; Wesleyan Guild, Miss Pansy Ferguson, North Wilkesboro; and Spiritual Life, Mrs. J.
