


# Selective Service, Rationing Boards

Mack Moore is chief rationing clerk for the entire county.

## Company Here Needs Men To Fill the Ranks

When the National Guard companies were mobilized in September, 1940, North Wilkesboro, as well as other towns and cities in the state, was left without a military company for civilian protection and service.

In the early part of 1941 the North Carolina State Guard was formed and North Wilkesboro was selected as one of the fortunate communities in the state to have a company.

Captain Harry H. Pearson, who now heads the company, was selected as commanding officer. He previously had six years experience in the U. S. Marine corps and was considered a most logical selection. At the same time, February 25, 1941, Lt. John L. Wells was commissioned a second lieutenant and on April 14, 1942, was promoted to first lieutenant. He gained military experience with the National Guard company here before it was mobilized.

The third ranking commissioned officer of the State Guard company here is 2nd Lt. John V. Wallace, who was commissioned on July 15, 1942.

North Wilkesboro and Wilkes county government units helped make the company here possible by furnishing funds to buy supplies and equipment, each having donated twice, and the state furnished a specified sum.

The first mobilization of the State Guard company here for service was in April, 1942, when the company was assigned to forest fire duty in the vicinity of Buffalo Cove in Caldwell county. The men served without fear of danger and completed their mission.

In July, 1942, Captain Pearson served as military aide to Governor Blood, of New Hampshire, during the National Governors convention at Grove Park Inn in Asheville.

Since that time the company has engaged in week-end camping trips and held several field maneuvers. In August, 1942, officers and non-commissioned officers of the company attended a training course at Gastonia, during which time a complete course in basic training was conducted by all officers and men.

The company has assembled and stood by twice to be called out for riot and fire duty.

In March, 1943, Captain Pearson, 1st Lt. Wells, 2nd Lt. Wallace and Sgt. Isaac Eller attended the officers' training school at Fort Bragg for a ten-day course and were taught the latest tactics in modern warfare.

The greatest need of the company at the present time is men. Ranks of the company have been thinned on many occasions by men leaving for service in the army, navy and marine corps and many others have left for war jobs at other points. Captain Pearson emphasizes that he can use men up to 50 years of age, and the officers especially desire that a score or more local men enlist in the company now. Either officer will gladly take application from any man who wants to render this type of service on the home front.
