NAZIS SHIFT WAR PLANTS

London.—The R. A. F. bashed the German arms center of Dusseldorf with nearly 3,000 tons of explosives Tuesday night while an American-led armada gave another "get-out-of-the-war" warning to Italy in a paralyzing attack eliciting cries of pain and anger from the weaker Axis partner.

A total of nearly 900 planes based in Britain and Africa struck the Axis in a violent general aerial offensive which authoritative source said was just a foretaste of greater glows aimed at tearing out by the roots the enemy's war-making capacities.

Perhaps 500 British bombers, most of them four-engined giants packing two-ton blockbusters, left a carpet of flames to eat through cratered Dusseldorf in a saturation raid almost equalling Sunday night's record of destruction heaped on Dortmund, 50 miles away.

Navy Is Seeking Construction Men In Seabees Group

There are openings for 9,000 construction workers in the Navy's Seabees, the construction battalions, and draft-age men are eligible to voluntarily enlist, it was announced today by Joseph E. Huffman of the Winston-Salem Navy Recruiting Station on duty here at the North Wilkesboro postoffice.

Handled in conjunction with Selective Service, men between the ages of 18 and 38 may make application for the Seabees, as well as 17-year-olds and men between the ages of 38 and 50.

L. L. Charles J. Dietrich, recruiting officer for the Seabees, will visit the Winston-Salem recruiting station on June 7, 8 and 9 and will be prepared to interview all men from this vicinity who are interested in enlisting.

Three letters of recommendation are necessary when an applicant reports for an interview. These letters should deal strictly with the applicant's experience and ability in the phase of construction which he wishes to follow in the Navy.

The Seabees' slogan is "Build and Fight for Victory," and that is a direct analysis of duty in the Seabees. Men in this branch build barracks, hospitals, wharves, roads, water and oil tanks, radio station, and many other Navy utilities.

Report Nazis Ponder Purge Of 'Lukewarm'

The Berlin radio said last night that a purge of the Nazi party to eliminate "lukewarm elements" had become a topic of discussion in Germany since a like measure was executed some months ago in Italy's Fascist party.

The Nazi broadcast, recorded by The Associated Press, said the removal of all party members who failed to set examples as fighters was announced at Mannheim by Robert Wagner, Nazi party official for Baden and Alsace.

Wagner was quoted as saying in a speech that "the party, and with the party, every member, both men and women, are responsible for the country's present and future."

Old Regulations About Overseas Parcels Altered

Only one package a week may be sent and the package must conform to overseas regulations. That means it cannot be over five pounds in weight and its length and girth combined cannot exceed 36 inches.

Parcels accepted under this arrangement must be accompanied with the written request for the articles contained therein. They must also have the envelope bearing the A. P. O. cancellation in which the request was received.

Week-End Beer, Wine Sales Are Prohibited Lenoir.—The county commissioners adopted an ordinance at their regular meeting prohibiting the sale of beer and wine through retail outlets of Caldwell county from 11:30 Saturday night until 7:00 a. m. Monday.

The county ordinance made the same provisions as one adopted by the Lenoir City council last week for the control of week-end beer and wine sales, with the exception of the hour the ban comes into effect.
