Washington. -- A powerful omber fleet, capable of blasting a pathway to victory in conquered Europe in the invasion clean sent them to the undersigned, up, is the goal of the General whose address is Wilkesboro, N. ed Europe in the invasion clean Federation of Woman's Clubs in its "Buy a Bomber" campaign. which was bunched today by its president, Mrs. John L. Whitehurst from Federation headquarters, here.

Fifty huge, four-motored bat tleships of the skies, costing \$15,-000:000 will be the nucleus for the Federation's "Fleet of Bombers" to be bought by the 2,000, 000 club women and their friehds in the 48 State Federations, Alaska and the District of Columbia through purchase of war bonds. and turned over to the United States Air Force.

The name of the individual State Federation, G.F.W.C." will be painted on the nose of the bomber, as soon as the State Federation has raised its quota of \$300,000.

This is the first women's or ganization to undertake such a gigantic war project.


