Five Arrested By Federal Officers On Liquor Counts

Alcohol Tax Unit Investigators and Deputy Marshals Make Arrests

During the past week federal officers in Wilkes county have made several arrests. The office of Marshal Edney Ridge reported the arrest Monday in Wilkes county of Carl Shaver and Farnell Combs, Wilkes county men, charged with operating a distillery in violation of the internal revenue laws.

Both men were given hearings before J. W. Dula, United States commissioner at Wilkesboro and released under \$500 bond each. Shaver is scheduled for trial at the November term of United States District court in Wilkesboro. Bond of Combs was directed to District court in Greensboro for trial Friday before Judge Johnson J. Hayes on charges of violating the terms of his probation.

Claude Whitley was arrested Saturday on a capias and charged with manufacturing and possessing non-tax paid whisky. He was given hearing before J. W. Dula, United States commissioner at Wilkesboro, and released under \$500 bond for trial at the November term of United States District court in Wilkesboro.
