worse than larceny," Judge Burney said, in sentencing Walker. "The loss of those materials might have conceivably delayed the completion of a ship and any man who does anything that delays victory one minute is guilty of sabotage."

When defense attorneys declared that Walker was a "little fellow" compared to others hindering or profiting excessively from the war effort, Judge Burney declared:

"You bring anybody before me for retarding the war effort and see if I don't set them on fire."

Walker, who pleaded not guilty to the charge, contended that the tools and materials were left in a garage which he had rented to an unidentified man at Carolina Beach and that he had transferred them to the trunk of his automobile.

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## 4-H Baby Beef, Hog and Wool Show and Sale

On October 14 and 15 at the Liberty Warehouse in Elkin will be held the 4-H Club Baby Beef and Hog show and sale for Wilkes and surrounding counties. An amount of \$250.00 is being offered as prizes on individual beef calves. Each animal will be graded according to standard grades and prizes awarded on the basis of these grades. Those animals grading Middle Good or Better will receive top prizes. Those animals that are Middle Medium to Low Good will receive 75 percent of the amount paid on the higher grades. Ribbons will be given for the

Grand and Reserve champions. A total amount of \$75.00 will be given as five prizes for county groups. Also \$40.00 will be given in three prizes for county groups of home-raised calves. Each boy or girl is eligible to win one of the three prizes totaling \$12.00 for fitting and showmanship. In addition to the above, the State, Local, North Carolina and American Angus Breeder Associations will add \$5 per head in the premiums won on individual animals.

A new feature consisting of a hot hog show and sale is being added this year. A total of \$100 in prizes is being offered. These hogs may weigh 100 to 250 pounds consisting of any breed or cross.

All Wilkes County Club members are urged to start now getting their hogs and calves trained and in condition for the show and sale. It is important that we have a large number of hogs shown from Wilkes county in order to encourage a large number of buyers in attending the sale. It will also enable each boy and girl to show other club members in this part of the state the fine job they are doing in club work. At the same time we will see the type

of work they have done. In the past these shows and sales have been held off at a distance and it was difficult for boys and girls to attend that did not have animals to show. Since this sale is being held at Elkin, we hope that a large number of club members will attend that do not have hogs or beef calves to show.

This is of primary importance as an aid to winning the war and as a safeguard against inflation. 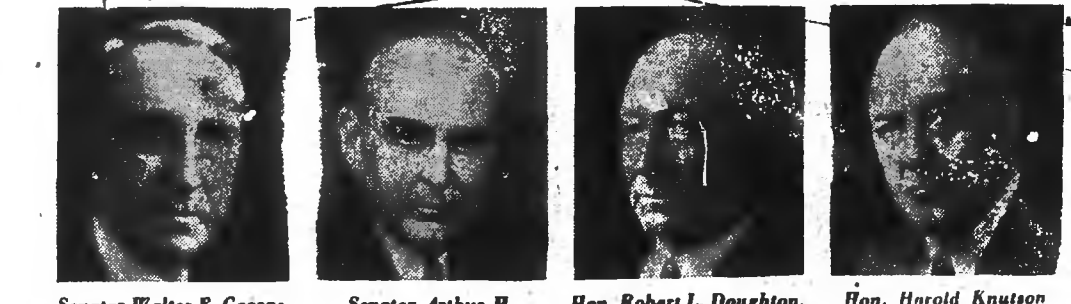
