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Egg Drying Work At Coble's Ends Account Shortage

Egg dehydration at Coble Dairy Products company plant in Wilkesboro was temporarily suspended Saturday for an indefinite time because the supply of eggs purchased was exhausted.

During the spring and summer months vast quantities of eggs were purchased and placed in storage. Not only was his supply built up for dehydration, but surplus eggs during the low price season were taken from the market, thus holding up prices for poultrymen.

Dehydrated eggs from the Coble plant have gone to many parts of the world as food for American and allied fighting men.

It is expected that egg dehydration will be resumed when the egg supply is sufficient.
