

FASCIST CHIEF LIKELY HEAD NEW REGIME

London—Benito Mussolini has been freed by Nazi paratroopers and elite guards, the Berlin radio said last night, and it was believed here that the former Duce immediately will be made head of a German-dominated "puppet" government.

Seven weeks to the day after Mussolini was ousted from the dictatorship, he held rule for 21 years, the Berlin radio, with a fanfare of trumpets, announced that "Il Duce is at liberty."

A special announcement from Adolf Hitler's headquarters broadcast by Berlin said that Mussolini, ousted on July 25th, was freed from the "traitorous clique" which was holding him and thus prevented the government of Premier Pietro Badoglio from delivering him as the No. 1 war prisoner to the Allies.

Brother Mrs. T. R. Hayes Dies

Fatally Injured In Car-Truck Accident Tuesday Of Last Week

Don Lee Redmond, 47, of 1614 Walnut street, Greensboro, died unexpectedly at 2:40 p. m. Thursday at St. Leo's hospital after being injured late Tuesday in a collision between a car he was driving and a truck tractor driven by Boston Magnalt, 38, negro, of 2241 Patterson street.

Redmond's condition had not been regarded as serious until a short time before his death, the injuries having been diagnosed as a broken rib and a sever leg injury.

The negro driver, who was charged Tuesday night with careless and reckless driving, was charged following Redmond's death with manslaughter, and posted \$1,000 bond for appearance for hearing September 24 in municipal-county court.

The accident occurred at Summit avenue extension and Twentieth street, the two vehicles side-swiping each other on wet pavement and crushed the left side of Redmond's car.

A native of Iredell county, Mr. Redmond had been a resident of Greensboro for the last 10 years and was employed as superintendent of the inspection room at Proximity Print works. He was a member of Eller Memorial Baptist church.

Surviving are his wife, the former Miss Mezie Wyrick; a son, Leo Redmond, Greensboro; his father, M. L. Redmond, New Hope; two brothers, C. C. and F. D. Redmond, both of Greensboro, and a sister, Mrs. T. R. Hayes, of North Wilkesboro.

Funeral service was held Friday at 4 p. m. at Eller Memorial Baptist church. The service was conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. H. Smith, the body lying in state for an hour prior to the service. Interment was in Forest Lawn cemetery.

hundredth birthday, rather quickly stated that he was much stronger today than he was one hundred years ago today.

This celebration took place at Mr. Luther's home where he had lived for more than 70 years. Mr. Luther advised his guests that 70 years ago he had served as postmaster for an annual salary of \$24.00, and that he last served as postmaster in 1934, and received an annual salary of \$800.00.

Several pictures were made of the Luther family and the descendants. At one o'clock all friends and relatives gathered in front of the Luther home and listened to an address given in honor of this centenary by J. Gordon Hackett, former Highway Commissioner, of North Wilkesboro, who was presented by J. B. Williams, Building & Loan and Insurance executive, of North Wilkesboro. After Mr. Hackett's speech, which was enjoyed by all in attendance, (Mr. Hackett's speech will be published Thursday in the Journal-Patriot), a paper prepared by J. B. Williams, of North Wilkesboro, giving a brief biography of Mr. Luther, was read by Mr. Williams (biography will appear in this paper Thursday), who although not a relative, is a close friend of the Luther family, having known Mr. Luther intimately for several years. Mr. Williams' grandfather went through the Civil War with Mr. Luther and on their return from the war Mr. Luther introduced Mr. Williams' grandfather to his grandmother. Following the paper by Mr. Williams, an address was delivered by Rev. Grady Hamby, prominent Baptist minister, of Banner Elk. Following this address a most elaborate and tasteful picnic dinner was served in a white pine grove near Mr. Luther's home, a Rev. Mr. Greene delivering the invocation. A beautiful birthday cake, on which were placed 100 candles, was placed in the center of the picnic table and just opposite where Mr. Luther, the centenarian, was seated. The dinner. This centennial celebration took place near the top of the Blue Ridge Mountains at an elevation of more than 3,000 feet above sea level.

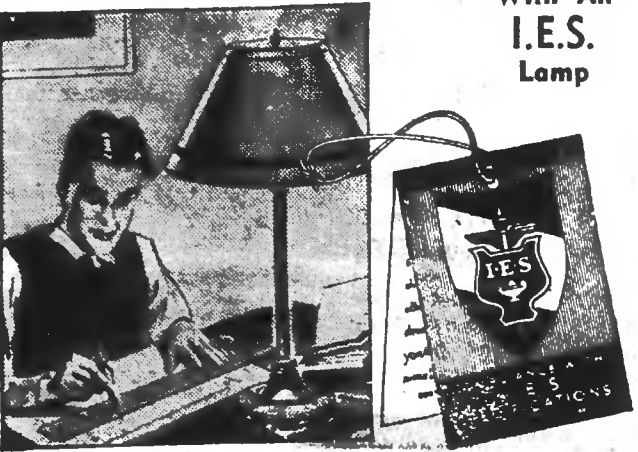
