## SEAPORT FALLS TO BRITISH AS YANKS BATTLE

Allied Headquarters, North Africa.—Slicing 40 miles across the heel of Italy, Allied troops have captured the big Adriatic port of Brindisi only 70 miles from Albania while in a continued fierce battle on the west coast Lieut. Gen. Mark Clark's Fifth Army has smashed into the hills behind fallen Salerno, front dispatches reported last night.

British Tommies who looped off the greater part of the heel in a swift overland drive from fallen Taranto found Brindisi's fine harbor in good working order. Leaving the co-operative Italians to run the city under Allied direction, the British drove on up the east coast in pursuit of fleeing German units which included the first paratrooper division from Sicily.

## Miss Kiter Bower Died On Friday

Funeral and Burial Services Conducted Sunday Afternoon in Wilkesboro

Miss Kiter Bower, one of the most highly esteemed and best loved ladies of Wilkesboro, died Friday morning about four o'clock at the home of her niece, Mrs. Bon Perkins, and Mr. Perkins. Miss Kiter, as she was familiarly known to hundreds of her friends, had been in very feeble health for the past several years, but on Thursday morning she suffered a severe stroke of paralysis and death followed only a few hours later.

Miss Kiter was born at Trade Tenn., the son of David and Rebecca Horton Bower. When only an infant, her parents moved from Tennessee to the beautiful Happy Valley section of Caldwell county, where she lived for a number of years, later going to Lenoir and making her home there with her brother, the late Congressman Horton Bower, one of the best known citizens of this section of North Carolina during the era in which he lived.

Later Miss Kiter came to Wilkesboro to make her home with her sister, the late Mrs. W. C. Winkler, and Mr. Winkler. She was a resident of Wilkesboro for about 30 years.

In early life, Miss Kiter joined the Methodist church, and as long as she was able to do so, she remained active in church work, attending Sunday school, church services, and missionary meetings with regularity. She was a devout Christian, and everywhere she went she spread sunshine and joy. Today, one of the circles of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Wilkesboro Methodist church bears her name and is known as "The Kiter Bower" circle.

Miss Kiter was the last survivor of her immediate family, and nearest relatives who survive her are two nephews, David Bower, of Lenoir, and John C. Winkler, of Wyco, W. Va., who was unable to attend the burial rites on account of illness, and the following nieces: Mrs. Carson Parlier, of Charlotte; Mrs. William Miller, of Hickory; Mrs. Bon Perkins, of Wilkesboro; Mrs. Ray Kennedy, of Wilkesboro and Wilmington.

The funeral services for Miss Kiter was held yesterday afternoon at the Wilkesboro Methodist church with the pastor, Rev. Fred H. Shinn, in charge, assisted by Rev. Howard J. Ford, pastor of the Wilkesboro Baptist church. Interment followed later in the afternoon in the Horton cemetery in Happy Valley.

A most beautiful floral tribute to the life of the deceased was carried by a number of ladies of the Methodist church and community, and the pallbearers were Charles G. Gilreath, W. E. Smitty, F. T. Crasor, J. C. Grayson, N. O. Smonk, and J. R. Henderson.
