Book 4 To Be Issued In Schools

Explicit Instructions Given By Ration Officials

War Ration Book 4 will be issued at all schools in Wilkes county between October 20 and October 30th. On Saturday, October 22, teachers will give an application blank for War Ration Book 4 to the oldest pupil in each family represented in the school. The pupil will take the application home. The head of the family will fill out and sign the application.

On Monday, October 25, the pupil will return the application ALONG WITH THE FAMILY'S WAR RATION BOOKS 3 to the teacher. During Oct. 25 and 26 the teacher will issue Book 4 to all families who apply through the pupils. No Book 4 will be issued to anyone other than the school pupils during Oct. 25 and 26. No Book 4 will be issued to anyone who does not present Book 3 to the registrar.

Persons who do not have children in school may request a neighbor's child to register for them. During October 27 and 28 each school will hold an open registration for all persons who do not have children in school.

Remember that no Book 4 will be issued to any person at any time who does not present a Book 3.

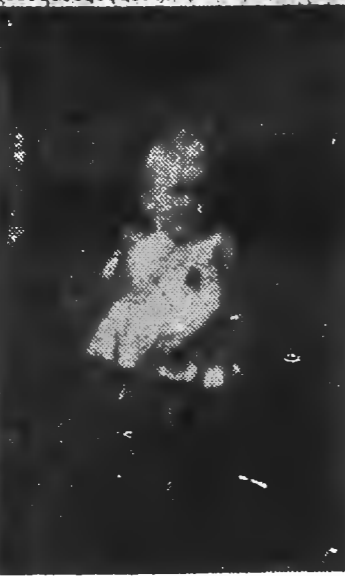
ALL OF CENTRAL SOLOMONS NOW IN ALLIES' HANDS

Jap Planes at Rabaul Destroyed; Allies In Italy Cross Volturno

American Fifth And the British Eighth Armies Move

Allied forces have secured a bridgehead on the north bank of the flooded Volturno River, it was indicated last night as the Fifth Army's right flank swept 15 miles up the rugged backbone of Italy and captured Riccia in a hard fight.

Moving closely parallel and possibly already united, the Fifth and Eighth armies had brought the full 40-mile length of the Termoli-Vinchiaturo lateral road under artillery fire as Gen. Sir B. L. Montgomery's troops advanced nine to ten miles, entering St. Elia and Bonefro. (BBC said the Allies were only one mile from Vinchiaturo.)

German broadcasts admitted that British and American troops had thrust strongly toward Vinchiaturo from Jelsi, just to the east. The Allies were violently shelling German positions in that sector and also had shelled Caporosso on the Termoli Road northeast of Vinchiaturo, where the Bishop was asserted to have been killed at mass.

'This Is the Army' Showing Sunday

All Profits From Premiere Showing At \$1.10 Each For Army Relief

Sponsors are expecting a full house for the premiere showing of "This Is The Army" Sunday afternoon for benefit of Army Emergency Relief.

The picture, which belongs to the United States Army, will be shown Sunday afternoon, three o'clock, October 17, at the Allen Theatre, and all profits from the sale of tickets at \$1.10 each will go into the Army Emergency Relief fund, which aids distressed soldiers and their families in emergencies. The organization is spending a million dollars each month for emergency relief.

L. M. Nelson is chairman for Army Emergency Relief in Wilkes and has secured committees from the Kiwanis Club, Lions Club, American Legion and Auxiliary to be in charge of advance ticket sales.

A jeep with mounted machine gun and manned by several soldiers from Morris Field, Charlotte, will be in the Wilkesboro Sunday afternoon and will be at the theatre during the one and only showing Sunday afternoon, three o'clock.

The picture will also run Monday and Tuesday at the Allen Theatre at regular prices, but only one-half the profits from the regular showing will go into the Army Emergency Relief Fund.

177 Enemy Planes Hit In Big Raid On Jap Base

A huge air armada crushed Japan's main Southwest Pacific fortress of Rabaul Tuesday, wrecking 60 per cent of its planes and 17,600 tons of its shipping, in a blow so titanic that the American air commander assessed it as "the turning point in the war" in that sector.

Three of the vessels sunk were destroyers.

Massing all available heavy bombers, medium bombers and fighters—making their debut over Rabaul—for the attack, Lieut. Gen. George C. Kenney's airforce surprised the enemy so completely that General MacArthur said the raid broke Rabaul's back.

Having already largely wiped out Japan's Wewak, New Guinea, air base by destroying some 500 planes there, the destruction of damage to 177 planes at Rabaul now gives the Allies mastery of the air over the Salomon Sea and adjacent waters, MacArthur said. "It was a crushing and decisive defeat for the enemy at a most vital point," the general said. "Almighty God blessed our arms."

Office of Civilian Defense has taken over the task of putting on a recruiting campaign for the Women's Army Corps.

Judge J. A. Rousseau, chairman of Civilian Defense in Wilkes, has appointed Mrs. Kathryn Lott, manager of the U. S. Employment Service office here, to head the WAC recruiting campaign in Wilkes.

The quota for Wilkes is three WAC's and it is expected that the quota can be filled if women interested will file application.

Mrs. Lott has complete information on the Women's Army Corps and will be glad to discuss the matter with any woman interested in enlisting in the women's branch of the United States army.

SUGAR—Stamp 14, good for five pounds of sugar until after October 31. Stamps 15 and 16 now may be used to obtain sugar for canning, good for five pounds each, valid until October 31.

GASOLINE—Coupons No. 6 in A look good for three gallons became effective July 22 and will expire November 8.

SHOES—Coupon 18 in the sugar and coffee ration book valid for one pair of shoes has no expiration date. No. 1 airplane stamp in look three becomes valid November 1 for one pair shoes.

FOOD—Blue stamps U, V and W valid through Oct. 20, X, Y, Z valid from Oct. 1 thru 7 and E in book three now valid; expire October 30. F will be valid October 17th to Oct. 30th.

FUEL OIL—New No. 1 coupon, Class 4 sheet, good for 10 gallons (1 unit), expires Jan 8; new No. 1 coupon, Class 5 sheet, good for 50 gallons (5 units), expires January 8; new No. 1 coupon, Class 6 sheet, good for 250 gallons (25 units), expires January 8.
