pointed as a WAVE civilian committee. These ladies include Mrs. Don Melville, Mrs. Richard Finley, Mrs. James H. McNeill, Mrs. Ed Atkins, and Mrs. Don Wadswell. Huffman pointed out that three of the above ladies have husbands serving in the Navy, and that a fourth had a husband overseas in the Army.

According to reports from the office of Lt. Commd. C. B. Neely, head of Navy Recruiting in North Carolina, at Raleigh, North Carolina led the nation last week in the number of applications for WAVES. Huffman said with the

supply of seventeen-year-olds steadily decreasing that from now on recruiting emphasis would be on the recruiting of young women.

"Wilkes county has certainly done its part in the enlistment of young men in the Navy," said Huffman, "and I am sure that the women of this county are just as patriotic as the men." There are many jobs now available in the Navy to women, and recent experience has shown that women are capable of doing these jobs better than the men they replaced. These jobs include such ratings as stores-yeomen, hospital apprentice, pharmacist mate, aviation machinist mate, parachute rigger, communications work, and Link trainer operators.

Huffman quoted from a letter just received from Wilkes county's newest WAVE, Seaman second class Edith Faw Minton, of Millers Creek, as typical of what young people think of their work after they get in, "I wouldn't give any job here for any I know of in my North Wilkesboro. The Navy is the most wonderful life I've ever experienced. You have to work hard, but it is interesting, and makes you feel like you are really doing something worthwhile."

Huffman said that Seaman Minton was stationed at Hunter College, New York City, where all recruits are sent at least one month for training, and from there to some of the other Navy Colleges for specialized training. Any of the five ladies on the Civilian Committee will soon have full information, application blanks, and booklets describing the work of the Navy women, and young women in the county are urged to see one of them for information now.

ROARING RIVER—Chairman, ORDER AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$84,000 REFUNDING BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF WILKES, NORTH CAROLINA.

BE IT ORDERED by the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Wilkes, North Carolina, as follows:

Section 1. That bonds of said county for the maximum aggregate amount of \$84,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the County Finance Act, as amended, for the purpose of refunding valid existing indebtedness of said county incurred for necessary expenses and for special purposes and evidenced by the following outstanding bonds:

\$40,000 4-3-4% Road Bonds, dated November 1, 1916, and payable November 1, 1943.

\$74,000 of the principal of \$74,274.95 4% Funding Bonds dated July 1, 1935, and payable July 1, 1950, which Funding Bonds are redeemable on January 1, 1944.

Sec. 2. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds herein authorized when due shall be annually levied and collected.

Sec. 3. That a statement of the county debt has been filed with the clerk and is open to public inspection.

Sec. 4. That this order shall take effect upon its passage, and shall not be submitted to the voters.

The foregoing order was finally passed on the 18th day of October, 1943, and was first published on the 21st day of October, 1943. Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said order must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.
