lulled in the fancy of an unreal present. After the last war we of America, did in a great way just that sort of thing. We forgot self reliance, and decided we should go to Washington for our solace. We asked the government to do those things we had been accustomed to do ourselves. And in many respects we relinquished our former heritage, dependence on our own efforts, to the bureaucrats in Washington. We have lullied into the feeling that the government owes us a living. The Lotus philosophy has enslaved us. We are now living under thousands of laws that have never been before a legislative committee. Many of us have adopted the ham and eggs philosophy, and through it and similar pleas, we have piled up a stupendous national debt. Everybody ought to have something from the public trough whether he did any thing for it or not. Thrift has been antiquated. It has led to the philosophy that wealth ought to be redistributed. Taxing would be one of the means of doing that.

"It took Pearl Harbor to wake us up to these conditions. We found ourselves in a mess. We are now waging a war that takes \$50,000 to kill one of the enemy, whereas in the Civil War it took fifty cents to get one man killed. We are at the place where we must only spend money that is necessary to the progress of the war. At the beginning of the war we owed 44 billions, we now owe 144 billion and it is estimated it will cost us 300 billions to win the war. We are now running in the red two billions dollars a month. At the beginning of the war we owed \$334 per person, we now owe \$1100 per person. Our government now owns and controls 20 per cent of all the business in this country. These facts ought to challenge every thoughtful American to sane thinking".

J. R. Finley read an article on "After War Planning", and then suggested we should be doing some thinking and acting ourselves for this community. He stated there are to be large sums of government money spent for flood control, and concluded that our Public Affairs Committee should be making plans for pressing our claims for the Yadkin river project. The president, in response to this request, asked the Public Affairs Committee to make a report and suggestions at the next luncheon.
