## Mrs. C. C. Hubbard Passes in Farmer

Asheboro, Nov. 17. - Mrs. Frances Walker Porter Hubbard, 75, wife of Dr. C. C. Hubbard, of Farmer, died at her home last night at 9 o'clock after an illness following a major operation last July. The body was removed from a Denton funeral home to the home at Farmer this afternoon.

Funeral services will be comducted tomorrow afternoon at o'clock at Science Hill Friends church, of which she had been a member many years. Burial will be in the old Asheboro

cemetery.
Mrs. Hubbard, daughter of the late David W. and Fannie Porter, of Guilford county and Asheboro was born in Asheboro and lived here until her marriage to Dr. Hubbard in 1893. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary last June. Prior to her marriage, she taught school in Randolpin county for about five years. During the 80's for about six years, she worked in the register of deeds office of Randolph. After her marriage, she devoted her life to her husband's profession. studying medicine herself and working with him in his practice

until she died.
She lived in Warthville for a number of years and in termer
