Questions-Answers By State College

Question: How long can I wait after my lespedera seed have matured or frost has killed the plant before harvesting the seed crop.

Answer: Seed of Common lespedera and Tennessee 74 varieties will shatter very soon after they ripen, around the first of November. These varieties should be harvested just as soon as possible after ripening or killing frost. Seed of the Korean lespedera do not loosen enough to permit the use of a seed pan until three to four weeks following ripening.
