Miss Toby Turner, the president, presided for the business session. Refreshments were served during the social hour by the hostesses.

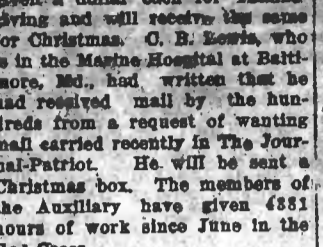
