YATES GETS SENTENCE

600 seized from Yates. Yates failed to appear in court to testify, or to be tried, and consequently the state was unable to allege any shortage in the amount of liquor inventoried after it was hauled to Wilkesboro from Yates' home. Judge R. Hunt Parker, who presided over the special term, ordered Yates' bond fixed at \$25,000, which he came in and filled two weeks ago.

In court last week Yates entered a plea of guilty, and stated on the stand that the 609 cases of liquor turned over to the county commissioners was about 60 cases short of the amount seized from him, according to his records, and that the shortage was in imported scotch and Old-Crow, the two most expensive brands. He stated further than on Sunday night before the special term of court opened on Monday, September 13, he had dinner in the private dining room of Princess Cafe in North Wilkesboro with Lt. Lents and Capt. L. R. Fisher, of the State highway patrol, both of whom were in the raid which netted the large amount of liquor, and that during the hour and one-half they were together that the cases against Lt. Lents and Scott and himself were discussed. Yates was on the courthouse grounds

when court convened September 13 at ten a. m. but left and was not seen around here since he came in and filled bond two weeks ago.

On motion of Solicitor Avalan H. Hall, which was allowed by the court, a transcript of the testimony of Yates in Wilkes county was ordered sent to Governor M. Broughton, who has shown much interest in clearing up the mysteries connected with the alleged disappearance of Henry, named from Yates and who ordered three separate investigations of the charges against the highway patrol and FBI officers.

Judge Pless in reprimanding Yates stated that he would have been a "key witness" in the Lents and Scott case in the special term. Judge Pless stated further that it was time Yates was finding out that the courts could not be evaded and that he should have been present when called, during the September special term as a witness against Lents and Scott for his own trial. Lents and Scott were acquitted by directed verdict from Judge Parker when the state had failed to produce any evidence that there was a shortage of liquor on hand or that they had taken any liquor.

The condition of one suspended sentence that Yates must testify in any case involving his liquor business was construed to mean that there is a probability of other indictments in connection with the alleged liquor shortage following the seizure of the vast amount of liquor, or that other of his associates may be brought to trial.

In other cases of alleged liquor shortage, Tim Yates, from whom 160 cases of whisky were seized by Sheriff C. G. Poldaxier, was fined \$500, given two years suspended, and placed on probation five years. Erasmus Yates, another brother, was fined \$150 and given 12 months suspended.

The case of Gus Shew, 75-year-

old, who was arrested by Sheriff Poldaxier and taken to the county jail, was ordered before Judge Pless for judgment. Shew was ordered to pay a total of \$140 as fine and costs.
