where to go. They are not wholly to blame, for it has happened in thousands of American cities. To meet this problem many of the cities have established a Y. M. C. A. or the Youth Center, where good, wholesome, recreational and spiritual activities are carried on. The Y. M. C. A. is not merely a building, but it is a board of directors or trustees and a body of people behind them.

"On Sunday, March 5th, a group of boys and girls got to-

gether with a few adults to hear Mr. T. O. McKnight, secretary of the Elkin Y. M. C. A., speak. The young people immediately became interested. This group decided to hold a mass meeting of all interested persons at the city hall the first Sunday in April at 7:00 o'clock, which will be of utmost importance.

"Mr. McKnight also told the young people that right now something could be done to better the conditions for our young people, which are getting worse every day. His main thought was to rent a house or building, where bowling alleys, ping-pong tables, and various other helpful games could be installed. Also have a man whose entire life is dedicated to the Y. M. C. A.

"This need is urgent, and the appeal not only comes from the young people, themselves, but also from the servicemen. You could never believe that a tremendous difference "Y" will make in a city.

"The young people are asking you to give them what is needed very badly, not only for them but for the lives of our citizens, also, and the boys and girls who will become the citizens of tomorrow in this community. They will be your doctors, lawyers, and business men in the future. What kind of citizens can they be, if they aren't given the right background to live in now? This is a challenge to each and everyone of you to strengthen your young people and our community."

Program Chairman A. C. Chamberlain presented John Brown, of the Winston-Salem club, who entertained the Club for the period with a lot of humor and home spun philosophy. Kiwanian Brown told a number of jokes on local members and made various applications of the points made.

He pointed out that the good fellowship that exists in a group such as Kiwanis is invaluable and through this sort of means we shall undertake to rebuild a torn world.
