tempt at light comedy she carries off her role with the assurance of a veteran, William Powell, of the "lifted-eyebrow" school of humor, does an about face with scenes in the film calling for him to squirt a hose in Spring Byington's face and even dance a kazotsky while under the influence of vodka.
