YANKS PUSH THROUGH KEY **HUB OF LA HAYE**

American troops smashed thru La Have Du Puits to its southern outskirts Wednesday in fierce street fighting, captured its rail station and by-passed the last pockets of German resistance on both sides for gains up to two and one-half miles.

The double outflanking drive cut the escape roads out of La ye both to the east and west, threatening entrapment of the battled garrison, and sent one spearhead racing down left of the city toward the small port of Lassay, five miles farther south.

A late dispatch from Henry T. Gorrell of the United Press said that same U. S. forces were withdrawn from the La Haye rail yards to avoid costly street fighting since the advances to either aide had already robbed the posi-

NIMITZ SEES END IN SAIPAN

Admiral Chester W. Nimits last night reported new advances by the American invaders of Saipan as he threatened Japan with increasing pressure throughout the Pacific and asserted that the enemy's current offensive in China will only "spur us on".

Nimits, disclosing that marine and army forces on Saipan had pushed 500 yards farther north since Tuesday's communique, told a press conference that he believed the Saipan campaign was near a successful conclusion, but warned that the Japanese still on the Marianas daland constitute "more than a nuisance",
