## North Wilkesboro Bank Authorized To Cash Bonds

The Bank of North Wilkesboro today announced that it is authorized by the U. S. treasury department to cash United States Savings bonds of series A, B, C, D, and E. The bank is authorized to give cash for bonds to holders whose names appear on the bonds, subject to treasury department regulations.

However, all bond holders are earnestly urged to hold their bonds, and not to have them cashed. In the case of an emergency where an individual must have the money, the bank is in position to cash them immediately.

## OVER 5,000 PLANES SLASH AT GERMANY

Overwhelming formations of between 5,000 and 6,000 Allied planes ranged ahead of Allied ground forces invading Germany in the greatest concentrated air attack in history yesterday, dropping 10,000 tons of bombs between the Siegfried Line and Berlin and destroying at least 52 more planes of the fading German Air Force.

The Allied bombers peppered the attack area with an average of ten tons of bombs a minute, an efficient example of "carpet" bombing introduced in Africa by Air Chief Marshal Sir Arthur Tedder, now Gen. Eisenhower's Deputy Commander. Tedder has intensified the assault method so it leaves almost nothing untouched in the area under attack.

Thirty-three German planes were knocked out in the air and 20 destroyed on the ground.

## Tire Theft Ring Is Broken Up By Arrest Of Four

Police Arrest Richard Bumgarner, Claude Higgins, Henry Reavis, J. Church

Arrest of four young men on charges of breaking and entering has apparently broken up a tire theft ring operating in this vicinity, Police Chief J. E. Walker said today.

The men arrested were Richard Bumgarner, of Wilkesboro, Claude Higgins, of Reddies River, Henry Reavis and James Church, of Millers Creek.

A hearing was held in city court and all except Bumgarner entered pleas of guilty. In his case probable cause was found and all four were placed under bond for trial in Wilkes superior court.

During the month of August seven tires were taken from G. D. Motor company, six from a Piedmont-Mountain Freight truck, and 31 from Central Service station.

Local police carried on an extensive investigation and after it was found that some of the stolen tires were being sold in the county clues were discovered which led to the arrests.

Nineteen tires, which were found at a service station operated by Clarence Benton near Purlear, and which were identified as being some of the stolen tires, have been recovered.

## No New Cases Polio In Wilkes County

State-wide figures on the number of infantile paralysis cases lists Wilkes with 36 cases. It was learned today from the county health office that the additional case listed for Wilkes is an old case which originated at least two months ago and that no new cases have been reported in Wilkes since August 2. It is quite possible that the number for Wilkes may be further increased because old cases which originated in June and July and which were never reported are being discovered.

## Parish Day to Be Held October 1st

Parish Day in St. Paul's Episcopal church will be observed on Sunday, October 1st. This has been a festive day in the parish each year since 1936 when the one hundredth anniversary of the first service of this church ever held in Wilkesboro was fittingly observed.

## City Schools To Open On Monday

The North Wilkesboro city schools will open with a full day's session on Monday, Sept. 18. Class work will begin at 8:30 a. m. and will continue for a full school day. High school and grades four through eight will dismiss at 3:00 p. m. Third grade classes end at 2:30 and second grade classes at 2:15. For the first few weeks of school the first grade children will remain only until noon.

All children who were enrolled in the school last year will report to their old home room for assignment for this year. Pupils in the first five grades, who are transferring to this school from another school, will report to the auditorium on the second floor of the elementary building. All beginners will report to one of the first grade class rooms.

New pupils in grades six thru high school should report to the high school office for assignment.

The high school office will be open on Saturday morning, September 16, for the purpose of registering any high school pupils who did not register last spring. Any high school pupils who desire any change in their class scheduled are requested to go to the high school office on Saturday morning in order to avoid confusion on the opening day.

All faculty members reported for duty this morning and will be engaged for the rest of this week in a work conference perfecting plans for the new year. This conference will enable the school to open on full time schedule from the beginning.

The school cafeteria will be open for service of lunch on Monday.

Opening date of the cafeteria in the Negro elementary school will be announced later.

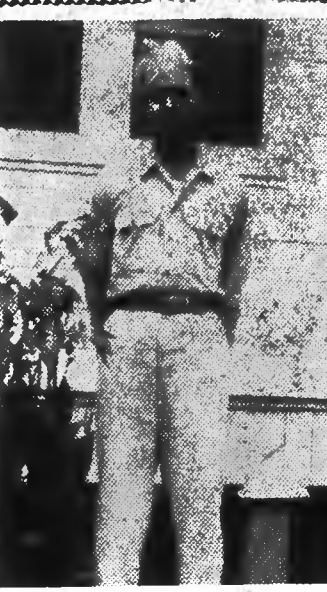
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## Serves In England

## MANY ENEMY CARGO SHIPS ARE SUNK

American carrier aircraft from Admiral William F. Halsey's Third Fleet destroyed more than 200 Japanese airplanes and sank numerous enemy cargo vessels in a day-long assault against Cebu, Panay and Negros islands in the Central Philippines Monday, it was announced yesterday.

Attacking within 200 miles of Manila, the carriers dispatched their actual fleets against "strong enemy opposition," and fragmentary reports from the scene of operations indicated the strike was continuing.

Wordings of the announcement suggested that an aerial battle of major proportions was developing over the Philippines archipelago. It appeared the Japanese may be building up aerial strength to combat the depredations of Halsey's carriers deep in the Western Pacific which began with attacks on the Palau group September 6.

Admiral Chester W. Nimitz reported several cargo vessels and numerous smaller craft were sunk in the all-day attack Monday.

Our planes shot down 50 Jap aircraft in combat over the Philippines and destroyed more than 180 on the ground.

## FIRST ARMY NEAR AACHEN

U. S. First Army troops cracked the outer wall of the Siegfried Line on a ten-mile front yesterday, closed in on the German city of Aachen and captured the frontier village of Rotgen, first town on Nazi soil to fall to the American invaders.

An armored column which had made the second American entry into Germany on Tuesday, took tiny Rotgen, nine miles southeast of Aachen. It was supplemented by a powerful tank and infantry force which made a third thrust across the frontier into the great State forests three miles southwest of Aachen near the town of Hergenrath.

As armored troops of the U. S. First and Third Armies penetrated the Siegfried Line outposts or shelled the defense wall at a number of points along a 100-mile front southward from Aachen to Thionville, a dispatch from Lieut. Gen. Omar N. Bradley's American headquarters in France said, "The invasion of Germany is under way in force."
