Ceiling Prices On Cigarettes Fixed

Local rationing officials have released the following ruling on ceiling prices for cigarettes: Popular brands such as Camels, Chesterfield, Lucky Strikes, Old Golds, Raleighs, Phillip Morris, etc., are covered by General Maximum Price Regulations, and the retailer's March, 1942, ceiling price, plus the additional Federal Excise Tax placed on cigarettes since March 1942 is their ceiling price today. This Federal Excise Tax figures 1-2c per package over the March, 1942, ceiling price.

When a dealer sells one package he may charge the full cent, but when he is selling two packages he must charge 1c over his March, 1942 price for two packages. For illustration, say a retailer sold Camel cigarettes in March 1942 for 15c. His price today will be 15 1-2c or 16c for one package, and 31c for two packages.

Premium cigarettes such as Marlboros, Herbert Tarletons, Fatimas, and Murads are covered by general maximum price regulation, and whatever price a dealer sold these same cigarettes for during March, 1942, is his price today, plus the same Federal Excise tax as in effect on the popular brands, which is 1-2c per package.

Economy cigarettes mean cigarettes frequently referred to as such, whether king size or regular size, and the most popular brands in this territory are Avalons, Beech-Nut, Domino, Marvels, Paul Jones, Sensation, Twenty Grand, and Wings. These cigarettes normally sold for less than the popular brands such as Camels, Chesterfields, etc. All such Economy brands of cigarettes since September, 1943, have been given a National Flat Price fixed by Amendment 22 to Revised Supplementary Regulation 14. The price is as follows: Single packages of twenty cigarettes are 13c. When selling two packages the price must be reduced 1c, or two packages for 25c. This is the price for which all dealers must sell Economy cigarettes.

Local Boards must, by all means, prevent violations or increases in prices, on cigarettes at retail. Many complaints have been received from consumers lately about dealers attempting to raise their prices on this commodity.

Notice to Buyers Of Used Trucks

Prospective purchasers of used trucks yesterday were urged by the Winston-Salem District office of Defense Transportation to make certain before acquiring the vehicle that their proposed operation meets all ODT requirements. Since October 25, 1943, Mr. Albert M. Cooper, ODT district manager at Winston-Salem pointed out, persons who were not designated motor carriers as of that date, have been required to show that the operation of the truck is necessary to the war effort or to the maintenance of civilian economy.

Application for a certificate of war necessity must be made and the ODN granted before gasoline allotments are made. Mr. Cooper reminded, or, in the case of a new service, application for authority to inaugurate it must be made. These application blanks may be obtained from the ODT district office in Winston-Salem. Critical shortages of trucks, tires and gasoline, the ODT official pointed out, make it necessary that only those operations deemed necessary to the war effort and essential civilian economy be approved and authority to operate a truck should be obtained by a prospective purchaser before he actually buys it.

It is estimated that more than 1 billion pounds of dressed chicken and 400 million pounds of turkeys will be marketed in the U. S. during the next four months.

Navy Yards Are In Need of Men

In line with the statement of Under Secretary of the Navy Ralph A. Bard that the increasing tempo of war against the Japanese demands more and more production work in U. S. Navy Yards, M. O. Davidson, Jr., civil service recruiter for the Norfolk Navy Yard, said at the U. S. Employment Service office here today that in the past few weeks the need for labor has grown more acute at Norfolk because of the acceleration of work on two great new aircraft carriers under construction there.

"The Navy's production program is still increasing", the recruiter said quoting the Under Secretary and, he added, "Both skilled and unskilled workers are wanted at Norfolk and are urged to apply at the Employment Office here."

The TARAWA, named in honor of the Pacific battle, and the LAKE CHAMPION, both combat carriers, are being built at Norfolk, he said, and many more electricians, pipefitters, welders, machinists and other skilled trades as well as laborers and helpers are being called for. Three hundred electricians must be obtained within the next four weeks.

Workers now in essential employment should not apply, but any others interested should see Mr. Davidson at the Employment Office without delay. High wages, free transportation and good housing are offered.


