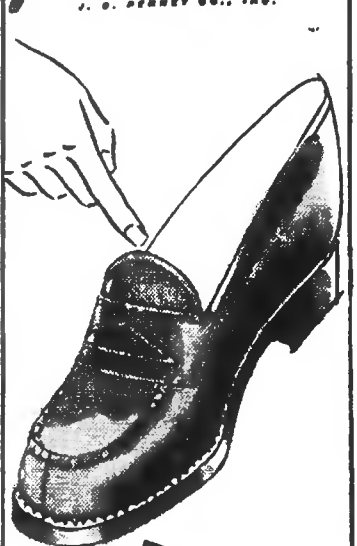
## Legion Auxiliary In Monthly Meeting
