Sen. Claude Pepper (D-Fla.) charged in New York that Dewey's advisor of foreign affairs, John Foster Dulles, had violated official confidences in a letter to a Connecticut voter stating that Republicans would be less willing to back peace plans if Mr. Roose-

relt were re-elected. Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes, in Salt Lake City, challenged Dewey to repeat his statement that the Administration had neglected the West, declaring that average crop values per acre there have increased from \$30.10 "under the Republican reaction" to \$95.94.

Meanwhile it was announced that Vice-President Henry A. Wallace would address a mass meeting in Gary, Ind., next Sunday afternoon and that Dewey's next major campaign speech would be made the following day, Oct. 16, in St. Louis.
