ENLARGES ITS BRIDGEHEAD

Paris.-American tanks crashed through the great German chemical center of Ludwigshafen on the Rhine today as the U.S. Third and Seventh armies Continued to grind disorganized German forces west of the river in the maw of disaster that may cost the enemy as many as 100,-000 men in killed, wounded and captured.

Lieut. Gen. George S. Patton's racing Third Army armored forces plunged straight through Ludwigshafen and reached the Rhine inside that city of 150,000 population. They sent another column slashing southward to the highway junction of Neustadt, where it was within 19 miles of another junction with the Seventh Armya new giant potential trap around the Nazis.

At the same time doughboys of Gen. Courtney H. Hodge's U. S. First Army east of the Rhine, reinforced by armor for the first ime since the original crossing wo weeks ago, enlarged the Remagen bridgehead northward as much as three miles and fanned out along a seven-mile stretch of the Segi River which flows into the Rhine north of Bonn

NAZIS PENNED INTO TWO

London.-Russian troops, nov speeding up their mop-up of the prize Eastern Baltic port system drove within four miles of Danzig and three miles from Gdynis Wednesday and penned the German remnants below Koenigberg into two 25-square-mile death

Employing what Berlin estimated at more than half a million men in their supreme Baltic push, the Russians also virtually divided the defenders of Danzig and Gdynia in a thrust to within two miles of the seaside resort of Zoppot, midway between the larger ports.

German broadcasts reported in the meanwhile, that massive Russian forces were poised northwest and southwest of Knestrin for perhaps the supreme drive on Berlin which is only from 30 to 35 miles away, and that preliminary thrusts already had been made in battalion strength.
