

Woman's Club to Help Recruit WAC Hospital Company

The U. S. Army medical department is calling for help—the help of women—to supplement the services of army hospital staffs whose members are too few to cope with the increasing flow of sick and wounded soldiers from overseas.

The kind of help they need is the kind that any intelligent, healthy and earnest woman can give. It is skilled help but does not require professional training. It consists in the performance of general hospital duties of a non-professional nature which by saving time of nurses and doctors will enable them to give their professional care to a greater number of patients.

WAC hospital units are now forming in each of the 47 states. The units, so far as possible, will be assigned for service in army general hospitals within their own states.

Members of the WAC hospital units are paid the same as other soldiers of equivalent grades. Their pay as technicians fifth grade, is \$68 per month with increase for each advance in grade—the highest grade receiving \$138 per month. In addition they are provided with food, clothing, quarters.

law and medical and dental care. These women must be between 20 and 50 years of age. They must have a minimum of two years of high school education. They must have no dependents under the age of 14, and above all they must be of excellent character and possess the sincere desire to serve. No previous hospital experience is necessary.

The army feels the need for WACs so urgently that they offer to the untrained woman full schooling for service as a medical or surgical technician.

The Woman's Club of North Wilkesboro has been asked to help in meeting this emergency. Mrs. John Leyshon, Mrs. Boyd Stout and Mrs. J. B. Carter have been named a committee from the club to help secure at least five women or more for this work.

Funeral service will be held on Wednesday at 11 a. m., at Walnut Grove Baptist church where Mr. Lowe had been a most active member for several decades. He would have reached his 79th birthday had he lived until Wednesday. Rev. E. V. Bumgarner will conduct the last rites.

Mr. Lowe was born in Alexander county, a son of the late Tilford and Saphronia Tritt Lowe. He was married to Miss Nancy Smith and they came to Wilkes, where he entered the orchard business. Throughout his life Mr. Lowe was active in church and community affairs and was a 50-year member of the Masonic fraternity, his membership being in Wilkesboro Lodge No. 45. Masons will conduct funeral rites at the grave.
