Wilkes Behind National Average In E Bond Sales For 7th War Loan

Sales of E bonds in Wilkes county have passed the halfway mark toward the quota of \$320,-000 but the time is growing short in the 7th War Loan and much effort will be needed to put the county "over the top".

The total to date as reported by Federal Reserve system shows Wilkes with 15 per cent of the E bond quota sold. The national average is 77 per cent. However, the entire state of North Carolina is behind with the exception of a few counties, and the state axerage is slightly more than half the quota.

# **MORE FORCES NOW IN BORNEO;** TAKE AIR STRIP

have seized Brunei air strip in an eight-mile advance and have pressed to within two miles of Brunei, capital of the British protectorate in Northwest Borneo, Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced today.

Simultaneously, another force landed on Borneo's west coast only two miles east of the Capital, catching Brunei in a vise from the east and west.

The forces that moved in from the sea advanced inland swiftly and seized high ground commanding the capital's water front.

The Australians to the north on Labuan Island, commanding Brunei Bay, were reported eliminating an enemy force west of the captured Labuan Air Field and were striking on north to within two miles of Timbalai Air Field.

Allied warplanes continued to give the ground forces close support while naval units also brought their guns into the bat-
