PFC. BUD WEST GETS BRONZE STAR

With The 85th Infantry Division in Germany.—Pfc. Bud West, a machine gunner for Company D, 820th Infantry was recently awarded a Bronze Star by Major General Paul W. Baade, Commanding General of the 85th Infantry Division, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near Schalke, Germany, on April 5, 1945, with the following citation:

"While on outpost duty at 0200 hours, Private West heard footsteps approaching his machine gun position. When the counter-sign was not given upon his challenge, he fired his weapon and wounded one of the enemy. They returned fire on the muzzle-flash of his carbine, but by then he was manning his machine gun. His heroic actions which induced an entire enemy patrol to surrender reflect credit upon his character as a soldier."

Private West entered the military service from North Carolina on May 13, 1945, a few months after his eighteenth birthday, and was previously awarded the Combat Infantryman's Badge. His mother, Mrs. Maggie Wolf West, maintains her home on Route 1, Boomer, N. C.

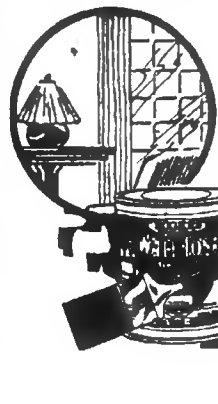
