
Born to Mr. and Mrs. Julius B. Brock a son, Larry Lee, on June 18th.

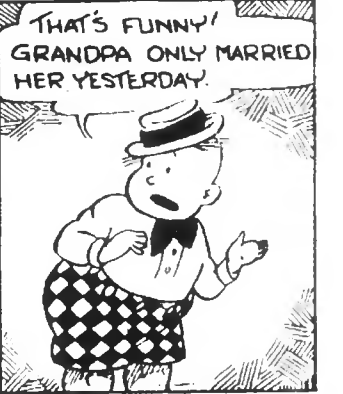
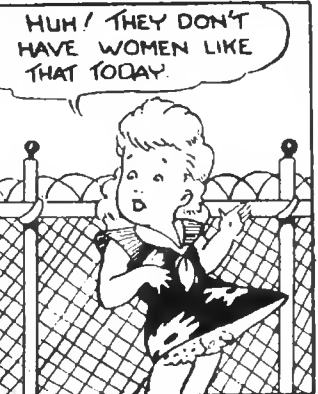
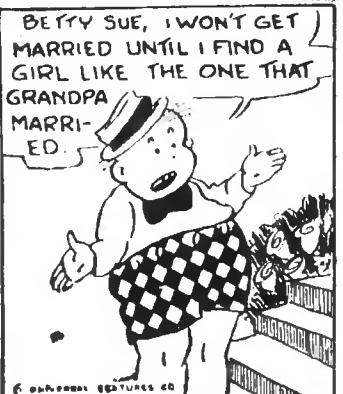
