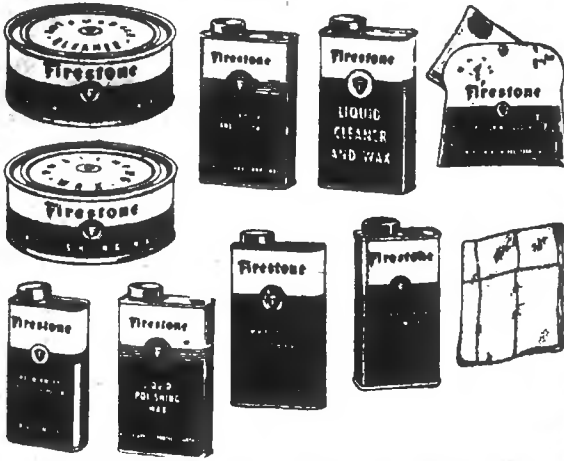

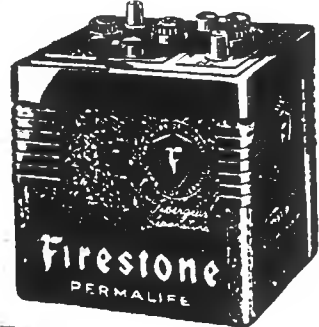

S.SGT. PAUL J. SHATLEY IS GOING TO PACIFIC
With a Thunderbolt Fighter Group in the European Assembly Area.—St. Sgt. Paul J. Shatley, of route one, North Wilkesboro, is now being processed at Camp DeCott, in the Assembly Area Command near Laon, France, with a veteran fighter-bomber group being deployed to the Pacific fighting area.

S.SGT. Shatley is a crew chief with this P-47 group, which protected Gen. George S. Patton's Third Army Loire River flank in his historic dash through France, and kept up a constant bombing and strafing of enemy communications and supply centers. In a single afternoon this group of Thunderbolts destroyed 766 vehicles.

S.SGT. Shatley is the son of Mrs. C. E. Shatley, of North Wilkesboro route one. Overseas 17 months, he is authorized to wear the Presidential Unit Citation, and E.T.O. Ribbon with 6 battle stars.

LT. Wm. HENRY TODD RETURNS FROM OVERSEAS
Lt. William Henry Todd, pilot of a B-24 Liberator bomber, who has been stationed with the 15th army air forces in Italy for the past nine months, has returned to the States and is now visiting with his mother, Mrs. P. D. McGinnis, of this city. Lt. Todd wears the Air Medal with Clusters, the Distinguished Flying Cross and a Presidential Unit Citation.

PFC. CHARLES DWIGHT HORTON HANDLES PWS
With the Fifth Army, Italy—Pfc. Charles Dwight Horton, of North Wilkesboro, is a member of a platoon which handled 20,000 German prisoners of war as hostilities ceased along the Fifth Army front in Italy.

He is one of the 105 members of the 85th "Custer" Division Military Police Platoon, who interrogated, searched and tagged the prisoners and saw to their feeding. The same unit, on a previous occasion, accommodated 4,200 prisoners, housing them in an enclosure that had penned up American prisoners only a few hours before the Germans were imprisoned there. Feeding the

Germans three meals a day, the MPs passed them through the show line at the rate of 50 men a minute.

North Carolina Leads The South in Milk
Raleigh—The average North Carolina cow produced 13.9 pounds of milk per day during June. This is less than two gallons per cow per day, but this figure is higher than for June of last year, when the figure was 12.8, is above the 10-year (1934-43) average of 13.2, and higher than for any other southern state, according to the Federal-State crop reporting service of the state department of agriculture.
