# Flood Damage Mounts; Efforts To Secure Flood Control Rushed

#### MEETING CALLED FOR FRIDAY **NIGHT; CONGRESSMEN ASKED TO MEET WITH VICTIMS OF FLOOD**

People from the Yadkin river valley in several north-Morth Carolina counties will gather at the North Mkesboro town hall on Friday, September 21, 7 p. m., b plan ways and means of expediting efforts to secure flood control on the Yadkin.

On Monday night and Tuesday the most disastrous flood since August, 1940, swept away hundreds of thousands of downs worth of agricultural crops in the fertile valley of he Yadkin and threatened many homes and places of business with damage or destruction.



Farmers in the valley, who had excellent crops but who were hopeless to save them as the muddy waters of the Yadkin swept them toward the sea, estimated that the damage may exceed \$200,000.

It was the highest flood on the Yadkin since the August, 1940, distaster, when the flooded Yadkin swept away millions of dollars worth of property and took a number of lives.

Following the 1940 flood, citizens of North Wilkesboro and other stricken communities in the valley pressed their requests for a flood control program, which was followed up by a comprehensive survey by engineers of the War Department.

The engineers recommended construction of a ten million do lar combination power and food control dam a few miles west of Wilkesboro. This prefect was eliminated by efforts of Senator Josiah W. Bailey from the flood authorization bill in congress last year on the grounds that it would inundate too much land and that too much priority was given generation of power over flood con-

Recently Senator Bailey was quoted as saying that he had asked the War Department for recommendations and estimates relative to construction of tributary dams and a smaller dam on the Yadkin exclusively for flood control, and has promised his efforts to secure adequate flood control program for the vailey.
