

## S.Sgt. Don Craven Killed By Accident On Okinawa 28th

Veteran Of Several Campaigns Ready To Come Home When Killed.

Staff Sergeant Don Craven, 25. son of Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Craven, of North Wilkesboro, was accidentally killed on Okinawa September 28, according to a letter from Chaplain R. S. Sillars to his parents under date of September 28.

The chaplain's letter, which is the only news of S-Sgt. Craven's death received here, stated that gun being cleaned by another man in the tent occupied by Staff Sergeant Craven accidentally discharged and the bullet went through S.-Sgt. Craven's abdomen. He died within a few min-

S.-Sgt. Craven entered the ma rine corps in 1941 and served with the marine air corps on Guadacanal and a number of other Pacific campaigns. He was home on leave during the early part of 1943 and returned to the Pacific area. He was a graduate of North Wilkesboro high school server as Field Scout Executive where he was a member of the football team and was popular and highly respected among the people of this city.

He is survived by his father and mother and the following brothers and sisters: W. A.
