Wilkes today had the coldest weather in five years.

Thermometer readings (unofficial) early today were from weather man promised no immediate relief.

This morning was the coldest weather here since January, 1940, when the mercury sank below zero on two or three consecutive mornings.

Practically all of the four-inch snowfall of Tuesday afternoon remained on the ground today and highways were slippery with snow and ice, making travel hazardous throughout northwestern North Carolina.
