Ronda School The Ronda school needs a 12-

oom elementary building with cafeteria and large auditorium for use by the entire school. The present building should be remodeled to house the high school and eighth grade.

Benham School This school needs an addition of two toilets, plumbing and sewage disposal system.

Clingman School Clingman school needs additional class rooms to take care of the students of that district and Dennyville. There should be added two toilets, plumbing, central hesting and sewage disposal system






