Veterans' Housing Governor Cherry To Address Rally **Project Lots Ready**

13.41 Acres County Motor Club Office **Home Property Is Divided Into**

Veterans Wishing To Build Now Should Make Application For Lots

Land obtained for the Veterans Housing project sponsored by the Wilkes post of the American Legion has been sub-dividand is now reday for veterans ho wish to erect homes immediately, it was learned today from officials of the Wilkes post of the American Legion.

For the project the Wilkes County board of commissioners allotted for sale 13.41 acres on the eastern boundary of the counhome farm on highway 268 ear North Wilkesboro.

This tract of land has 390 feet frontage on the highway and extends 1,500 feet north from the highway. A street 40 feet wide will be constructed directly through the middle of the property at right angles to the highway and the lots will front the street on both sides.

Engineers have completed the state commander of the organisurvey work and have divided zation, in an open meeting held the tract into 117 lots with 25 in the North Wilkesboro school feet front by 175 feet deep. Each auditorium Monday evening. veteran may purchase up to three lots, which will result in about 40 home sites.

The purchase price and survey costs for the entire tract totaled me alabitho toog guige plained that the price will be pro-rated on the lots according to their relative value. Veterans who are ready to build homes ity in order that the housing shortage may be alleviated as veterans are requested to look over the lots, make first, second and third choices and make their applications to Harry Kerley, Legion adjutant, or to Henry Landon.

The Legion will ask that the housing project be incorporated Town of North Wilkesboro and that city water lines be extended to the lots.

MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION Fire Prevention Week, 1946

Citizens of North Wilkesboro were called upon today by Mayor R. T. McNiel to take an active part in the nation's observance of Fire Prevention Week, starting October 6.

The mayor drew attention to President Truman's proclamation setting aside the week for annual ob-

"President Truman," said the mayor, "has appealed to the nation to safeguard its resources against destructive fires. He stressed the danger of fire waste when this destruction is taking place at a time when our country is faced with a shortage of food, housing, and nearly every commodity essential to speedy reconversion to a peacetime economy and the fulfillment of our obligations to the war-torn countries and starving peoples of the rest of the

"Therefore, as Mayor of North Wilkesboro I earnestly request every citizen and every organization to heed the President's appeal and to unite their efforts under the leadership of the fire department, chamber of commerce, and other agencies in inspecting all properties and premises so that fire hazards may be promptly detected and eliminated. Furthermore, I call upon our people to acquaint themselves with all circumstances and situations that are likely to cause the outbreak of fire and with the steps that should be taken when fire occurs."

At the same time J. B. Williams, Presidnet of the Wilkes Chamber of Commerce announced that the Wilkes Chamber with the collaboration of the fire department had formulated an extensive program of activities for Fire Prevention Week which will enlist the efforts of all citizens in Wilkes County.
