Colored Man Killed Auto Accident Here On Saturday

Roy Estel Mabe, Taxi Driver, Held For Speeding and Manslaughter

Charlie Horton, aged colored man who had been making his home with relatives here and at Boone, was instantly killed Saturday, 11 a. m., when he was hit by a tani near the corner of Main and Fourth streets.

Roy Estel Mabe, local driver, was arrested and held under bond on charges of speeding and manalaughter.

Police Chief J. E. Walker said that evidence indicated that Horton walked from between a pickup and truck into the center of Main street, where he was hit by the left front side of the taxi traveling east.

The truck and pickup were stopped for the traffic light and were headed west on Main street. Witnesses said that the taxi went under the changing light and struck Horton as he was crossing to the south side of the street

Funeral arrangements for Horton had not been completed this

Wilkes Chamber Plans Event On Reforestation

Selected Group of School Students Chosen for Forestry Study

R. D. Smith, sub-chairman of the Wilkes Chamber of Commerce Agriculture Committee announced today that the chamber and the Extension Service would hold a Wilkes Forestry Field Day on December 4th. "This project has been plann-

ed in line with the Wilkes Chamber of Commerce policy of building every economic factor which has any bearing on the wealth of Wilkes County, Smith said. "One of the first steps in growing a good crop of timber is, of course, to have trees of a good timber variety. Unfortunately too often in the past little thought had been given to the future composition of our forests and as a result our present woodlands are often, composed of mostly weed trees."

The Wilkes Chamber of Commerce, together with the Extension Service are planning to help correct this situation in Wilkes County by holding a Forestry Field Day this coming December 4th for a selected group of fifty-two Wilkes County school boys fourteen years and older. Mr. R. W. Graeber, State Extension Forester, will be in charge of the one-day forestry school to be held in a local woodland. The boys will split into groups and rotate from one instructor to the next. They will be shown the proper way to thin young timber. how to scale and estimate volumes of standing timber, how to selectively cut a stand of saw timber along with other proper forestry practices. At the field day several prises will be awarded is, for example, one of the prizes will be an Indian Fire by the manufacturer. D. B. Smith and Company of Utica, N. Y. The prizes will be on exhibit at the Chamber of Commorce.

All the boys selected to attend the Forestry Field Day will be eligible to receive one thousand tree seedlings which will be donated by the Wilkes Chamber of Commerce, provdied boys have a place to plant the trees and also receive permission from their parents to plant the seedg lings; then in the Fall of 1947 the boy who has the highest survival of the trees he planted will receive a prize.

The boys were selected by a tree quiz held in the schools of the county the past two weeks by either R. D. Smith, County Agent; Mr. D. D. Williamson, Assistant County Agent; or Mr. John E.
