S. V. Tomlinson, Business Leader, **Died On Tuesday**

Funeral Service For Pioneer Business Man Held Here This Afternoon

S. V. Tomlinson, 65, outstanding business leader and one of northwestern North Carolina's best known citizens, died at his home on C street in this city Tuesday afternoon, five o'clock. Death was attributed to a heart attack. Mr. Tomlinson had been in failing health for the past three years. A month ago he went to the Baptist hospital in Winston-Salem, where he rested for three weeks. For the past week he had been at home and had been confined to his room, although his condition was not considered serious.

Seebohm Virdia Tomlinson was born October 23, 1881, at Hunting Season East Bend in Yadkin county, a son of the late W. V. and Sarah B. Benbow Tomlinson. While a young man he came to North Wilkesbore, which was then a Robert Johnson, Game Proaprawling village.

For a short time he worked in Wilkesboro for his uncle, L. S. Benbow, before entering business here in 1904.
