Soldier Bonus Bills Introduced

Washington.—Two Democratic Representatives introduced bills yesterday to provide a soldier bonus despite President Truman's contention that no additional 'veterans' benefits are needed.

Representative Stephen Pace (D-Ga.) proposed that veterans receive \$5 for each day of overseas duty and \$4 for each day of domestic service. No ceiling on the bonus was proposed. The bonus would be paid immediately.

Representative Donald L. O'Toole (D-NY) would give \$4 a day for each day of overseas service and \$3 for domestic duty. However, O'Toole's bill provides for bonus certificates which could not be cashed for five years.

Despite President Truman's statement that the veterans' program is about in final shape, veterans groups planned renewed pressure on Congress for more liberal Government benefits.

Also introduced yesterday was a bill by Representative Jack Z. Anderson (R-Calif) to exempt from income taxes all compensation received by members of the armed forces during the war, dating back to Pearl Harbor. Taxes already paid would be refunded.
